Music follows the Charanga Scheme of work which shows progression and the building of skills. The topics in each year may change term. We also have North Herts Music Services teach Djembe drumming to Years 3, 4, 5 for a term each year.

Our approach to the Music Curriculum:

Learning in music is not linear, but instead skills and knowledge are deepened through careful repetition and breadth of experience. This is why we have chosen a 'spiral of learning' type approach for our Scheme.

The best way to help regain, develop and deepen skills and apply these to the students' growing knowledge is through practical activities, demonstration and discussion.

In this context we consider:

- -Skills (being able to do something) are ongoing and growing constantly through the spiral.
- -Knowledge (knowing about/experience) is related to the specific topic they are studying.
- -Mastery means both a deeper understanding of musical skills and concepts, and learning something new. Musical teaching and learning is not neat or linear. The strands of musical learning, presented within the lesson plans and the on-screen resources, are part of the learning spiral. Over time, children can both develop new musical skills and concepts, and revisit established musical skills and concepts.

We comply with the Equality Act 2010 and the Special Educational Needs and Disability Regulation 2014 by ensuring that the Music Curriculum is accessible for all learners through adaptations to meet the needs of our children.
